First and Second Semester Indonesian

About the Course

Level one Indonesian introduces the students to the elementary Indonesian conversations as well as develops listening, reading and writing skills in the communicative basis. Students will also learn basic grammar rules presented in the real life contexts. As an important component of language learning, students will gain insight into the culture of Indonesia.

Students will involve in the various language learning activities both inside and outside classroom. Students will also have the opportunities to learning the language through the technology such as using multimedia lab, internet and video. *Indonesian will be the language of instruction. Any concerns needed to explain in English should be addressed outside the language class or in the teacher's office.*

The course meets Monday through Friday from 08.00 to 12.10 pm in 375 Van Hise and 379 Van Hise. In addition to the language instruction, the Indonesian program has the language table on Fridays at 5 - 6 pm in the Memorial Union (Terrace or Rathskeller). This activity provides a good opportunity to practice Indonesian with the native speakers in the relaxed atmosphere. The language table is not a compulsory activity for the class.

- a. Participation: students' involvement in class activities.
- b. Homework:
 - ✓ Journal
Students are encouraged to compose simple form of writings such as uncomplicated paragraph related to the daily activities in their journals and submit them to the teacher on **Friday**.
 - ✓ Assignments related to the topic and function of the lesson should be submitted at the following day after the given task. Three days late submission will not be graded.
- c. Projects are due on July 1, July 22 and August 5. The project is an *oral presentation* on your own topic which expands and reflects the language functions and vocabulary learned at this level. Students are to discuss topics and activities for the project with the instructor.
- d. The summer program is divided into two sessions. Each session has oral and written final exam.

Course Policies

In addition to the policy in the Indonesian program, SEASSI has general absence policy. SEASSI is an intensive program in which each day's activities equate to a full week of academic year language study. Consistent and active participation is essential and elective absence is discouraged in the strongest possible terms. A day of elective absence reduces the highest possible grade that a student may earn by one level. Thus, a student who elects to be absent for one day of class can earn at most a grade of AB. A second absence reduces the highest possible grade to B, and so on.
