### About the Course

The third year Indonesian introduces the students to the advanced Indonesian conversations and discussions as well as develops listening, reading and writing skills in the communicative basis. Students will deal with various academic and non-academic texts as well as formal and informal discussions and writings. As an important component of language learning, students will also gain deep insight into the culture of Indonesia.

Students will involve in the various language learning activities both inside and outside classroom. Students will have the opportunities to learning the language through the technology such as using multimedia lab, internet and video. *Indonesian will be the language of instruction. Any concerns needed to explain in English should be addressed outside the language class or in the teacher's office.*

In addition to the language instruction, the Indonesian program runs the conversation table on Fridays at 5-6 pm in the Terrace, Memorial Union. This activity provides a good opportunity to practice Indonesian with the native speakers in the relaxed atmosphere. The conversation table is not a compulsory activity for the class.

a. The participation will be graded based on the following criterion: 5 (well-prepared, engage to and participate fully in the classroom activities); 4(participate in the classroom activities); 3 (tardy but participate in the classroom activities); 2 (present, but passive); 1 (tardy and passive); 0 (absent).

In addition to the policy in the Indonesian program, SEASSI has general absence policy. SEASSI is an intensive program in which each day's activities equate to a full week of academic year language study. Consistent and active participation is essential and elective absence is discouraged in the strongest possible terms. A day of elective absence reduces the highest possible grade that a student may earn by one level. Thus, a student who elects to be absent for one day of class can earn at most a grade of AB. A second absence reduces the highest possible grade to B, and so on.

- c. Small projects include sharing, presenting and creating activities based on your own materials. Please discuss your ideas with your instructor.
